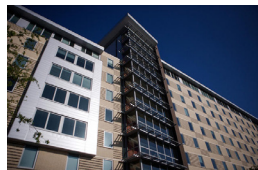

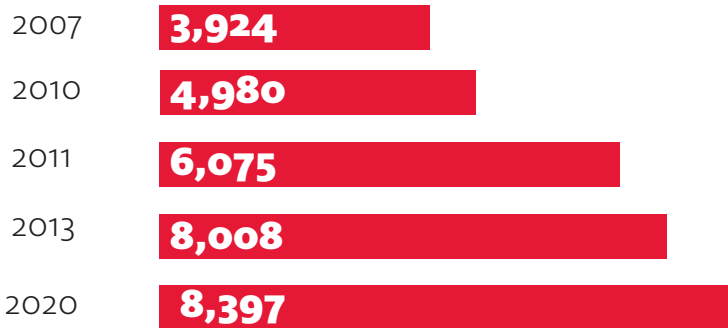

96% Respondents who reported feeling academically prepared for the semester

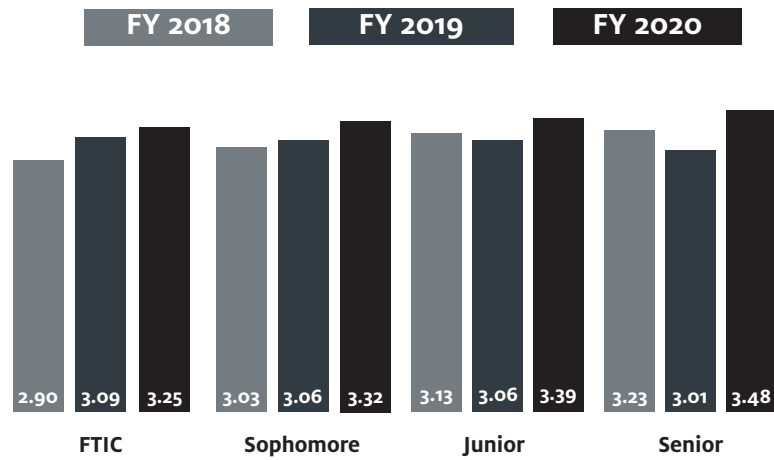

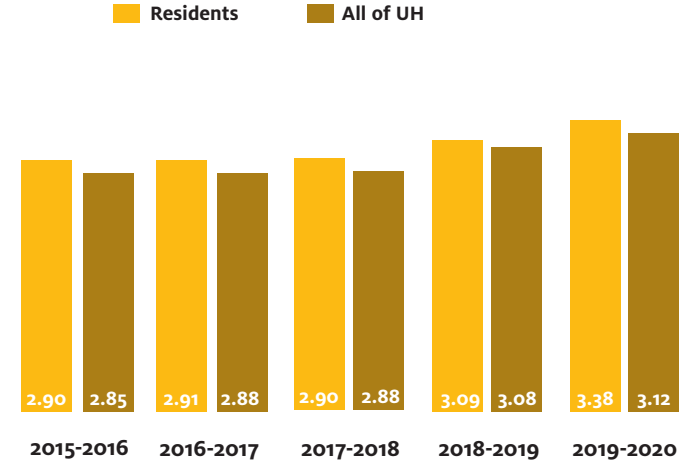

Resident GPA Data

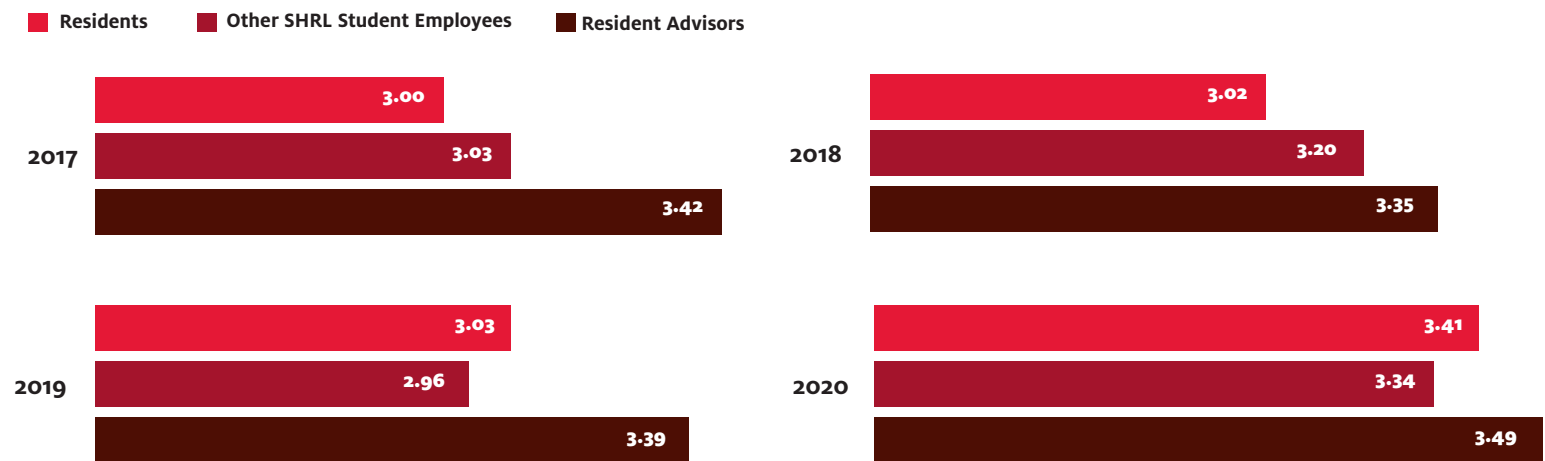
Residential Students GPAs

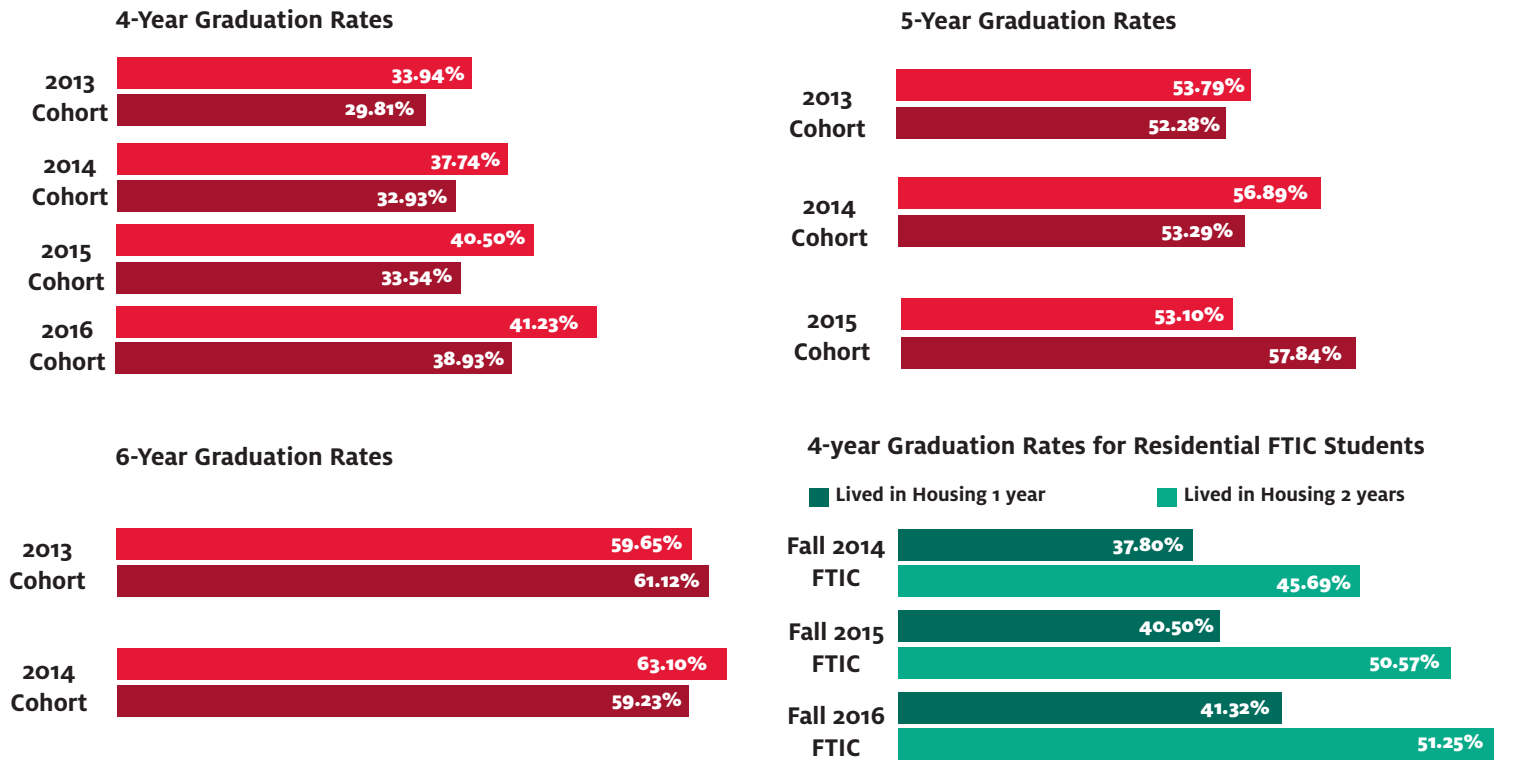

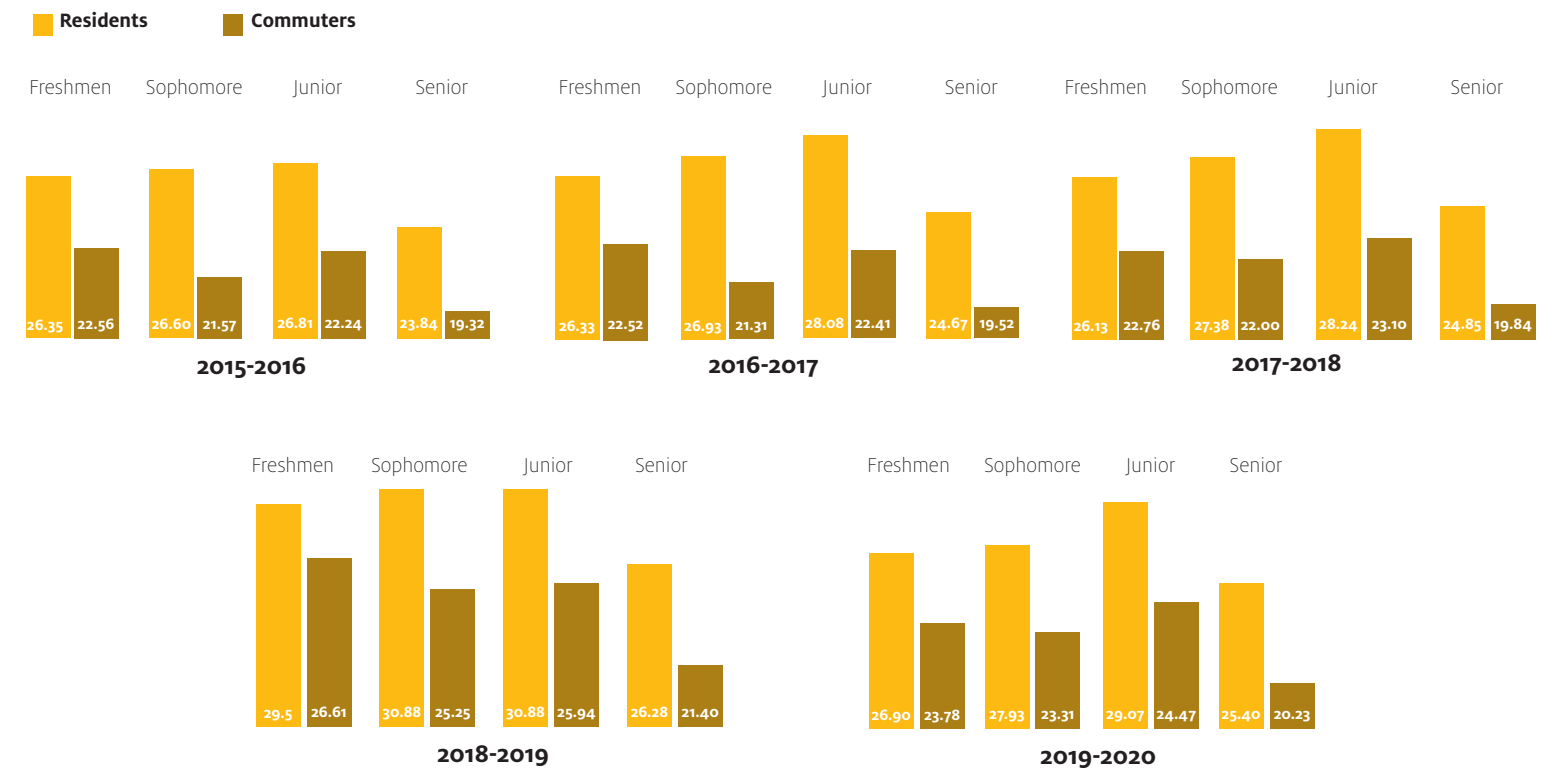
Graduation Rates and Timelines

Over the span of the past 5 years, on average, residential students complete 4.39 more credit hours per year than their commuter counterparts.

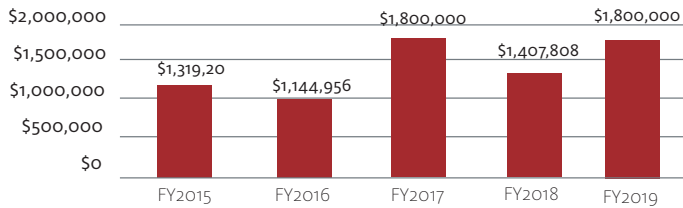


Conference Services & Guest Housing

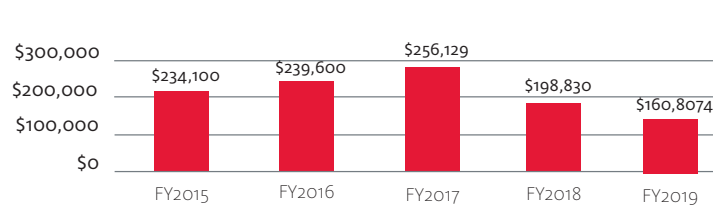
The Conference and Guest Housing Program is a service available to groups that desire quality accommodations in an academic setting. 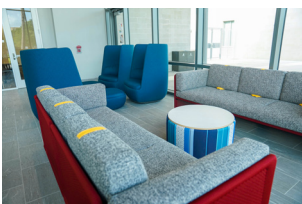

Housing Operations and Outreach provided excellent customer service to students, their families and guests in the following ways:

- Provided flexibility to students who were impacted by COVID-19 and the Harris County Stay-at-Home orders by allowing students to cancel their agreement and receive a refund.
- Rewrote the Residence Halls Service Agreement for implementation in the 2021/2022 agreement cycle. Changes to the agreement include adjusting the upfront cost to apply for housing at UH from \$350 to \$99, and extending the deadline for students to cancel their agreement without penalty prior to move in.
- Saved students \$2.5M in up front housing costs by no longer requiring a \$300 prepayment at the time of application.

The Quad



In 2018, Student Housing and Residential Life began to rebuild the historic community to support the growing population of students at the University of Houston. Under its new name, The Quad added 1197 beds to housing's portfolio and features suite-style living with private bedrooms, modest kitchens, and shared common areas in each suite. The Quad is also home to seven townhomes, which house several Living Learning Communities, where students with common interests benefit from high levels of interaction and faculty engagement outside of the classroom. As a tribute to the original Quadrangle, five unique outdoor courtyard areas were designed and named after the original residence halls within the Quadrangle: Bates Courtyard, Law Courtyard, Oberholtzer Plaza, Settegast Courtyard, and Taub Courtyard. The Quad opened its doors to residents in August 2020.
