I. Course

A. Catalog Description

A comparative study of policies, practices and research between the U.S. and Turkey through study abroad.

B. Purpose

The purpose of this course is to critically analyze the policy formulation, practice implementation of the social welfare systems and social work research in the US and a country (or countries) outside of the United States. This is an elective course that includes lectures, seminars, and site visits through study abroad.

II. Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Compare the service delivery systems of the countries, including mandatory and optional services in social welfare and social services (in governmental sector and non-governmental agencies).
- 2. Critically analyze the implementation of social welfare policies, practices and research in Turkey and the U.S.
- 3. Identify and delineate international perspectives to improve ways of working with disadvantaged populations from diverse cultural backgrounds in the U.S. and Turkey.

III. Course Content

Students will use comparative approaches to analyze the social welfare policies, practices, research and the service delivery systems in the U.S. and Turkey. Content areas include: international and comparative frameworks in policy and practice analyses, social welfare and related practices in the countries, governmental and not-for-profit sectors for the implementation of the policies, cross-cultural learning exchanges with social work students and social workers in Turkey.

IV. Course Structure

This course will be taught using a combination of instructional methods including international travel, lectures, group discussions, and papers. The course will be divided into three segments: (1) overview of Turkey and social considerations; (2) Travel to Turkey; (3) Post travel discussions considering alternative welfare programs.

VI. Course Requirements

A) Log (50 pts of grade)

Students will keep a daily log of the trip. Each entry includes observations, reactions and insights.

B) Paper (50 pts of grade)

The final paper compares a social policy in a specific area across the United States and the Turkey. The paper should be organized around a "puzzle" (why does the Turkey and the US with similar problems address them in different ways?) and should advance a coherent argument that explains the puzzle with reference to the theoretical literature covered in the course.

Students will then be required to turn in the paper on June 16, 2006.

<u>Please note that the papers will only be accepted as email attachments and no late papers will be accepted.</u> All papers will be written according to APA style; visit the following APA web site for specific guidance - http://www.apastyle.org/elecref.html. In addition, you are expected to include (that is, reference the news) current event information from the newspaper to support your discussion.
